Nature Notes

The dearth of summer insects has continued well into July and even farmer Clarkson of Diddly Squat Farm has concerns. Butterfly conservationists are worried because numbers have been continually falling for some years. Early returns from Butterfly Watch are not encouraging with over ten percent of people failing to see a butterfly in the allotted time. Bat conservationists are finding bat body weights have fallen, reflecting lack of insect food.

Particularly on an evening, swifts have been circling the village in tightly formed groups, screaming as they pass their nests. This is twofold, one to encourage their young to leave their nests, and secondly that it is nearing time to migrate. My best estimate suggests we had at least twenty birds, which now appear to have gone.



One summer migrant that is closely related to pheasant and partridge is the quail. These birds arrive from North Africa in late spring and breed in the fields around the village. They are rarely seen but have a very distinct "pick-perwick" call, which is very loud for a small bird. A few have recently been heard locally. Like many migrant birds they're unfortunately subject to net trapping as they cross east Mediterranean countries, where they have been hunted for hundreds of years.

The winter barley has now been harvested and the straw baled. I started to use the combine harvester on the 3rd Friday in July, but I had to stop after 50 metres because a bearing on the return's auger had seized and it took 20 hours of work to replace it. Luckily, I had a replacement bearing in my workshop, so I didn't have to wait until Monday to buy a replacement. 50 years of repairing farm machinery has taught me that if one bearing wears out, it's prudent to buy a second, which will soon be required.

The sheep shearing is now completed but this is around a month later than normal, partly because the weather was very cold last month and also because I had covid and didn't feel able to tip over 16 stone sheep to shear them. I had a heart attack after my last infection of covid and wasn't going to risk that again.

Although the summer has been showery, somehow, we have been able to make much more hay than normal. The rainy spring has given excellent crops of grass and there have been enough dry intervals to make the grass into hay.



Scruton Sky-at-Night

Comets/Meteors - The 'Perseid' meteor shower will 'peak' around the 11 – 13th August. Look north-east, after the Moon has set (~11 pm). The display can be quite prolific as the dust from comet Swift-Tuttle burns up; the best views are after midnight.

Constellations - The summer 'triangle' continues to dominate: Vega in Lyra (The Lyre) is close to zenith, with Deneb, in Cygnus, to its east, and Altair, in Aquila (The Eagle), southward.

Planets - Saturn rises after 9 pm and on the 21st, the Moon will occult this beautiful planet. It is the first occultation, seen from the UK since 2007. In the morning of 27-28th, the crescent Moon will form a group with Jupiter and Mars.

Gardeners' World

The warm weather has arrived, and tomatoes are ripening. If they are in a greenhouse they need plenty of ventilation; water sprayed on the floor helps to increase the humidity as they can overheat. Lavender is flowering and if you make lavender bags or put it in bowls, now is the time to pick it. Choose freshly opened flowers, hang bunches upside down to dry in a well-ventilated, dark place like a shed or garage.

Phlox, one of my favourite perennials, are flowering well and seem to have liked the earlier damp conditions as they have grown quite tall. They come in many colours. If the soil becomes too dry they will wilt, but just give them a can of water to revive them.



If you have any Box topiary or hedging, now is the time to trim them, choose a cool, damp day; if it is too hot and sunny they will scorch. If they are in pots give them a feed of fertiliser and a good water and they will soon reshoot. Box is easy to grow from cuttings. Strip off the bottom leaves from a cutting 5-6 inches long, plant in loamy soil and in a few months you will have new plants for free. One drawback with Box is the Box Tree caterpillar which can appear when the temperature and humidity rise and can quickly de-foliate the plants, so inspect them regularly. Keep dead-heading roses and sweet peas. It's an almost daily job but worth the effort.
