Gardeners' World by Elizabeth Davies

It has been an extremely wet winter, almost impossible to get on the ground, but a good time to re-plan the garden and to experiment with contrasting shapes, textures and colours. Gardens never stand still and always need rethinking. Snowdrops are finishing and this is the best time to split them 'in the green' when they transplant much better than growing from bulbs. Divide large clumps into roughly 5-6 bulbs and plant them covering the white part of the stem.

Hellebores are in full flower. Cut down their leaves to the base to see the flowers properly, this will also help to eradicate the virus which they may get that causes brown blotches on their leaves. Leave them to set seed, save some. Pot them up and in two years you will have new plants for free.

It is time to sow sweet peas. Put 4 seeds in a pot and transplant them against a trellis or wigwam of bamboo or twigs. For larger flowers and longer stems, plant them individually. I have planted half my broad beans in pots in the greenhouse for an early crop and will plant the rest next month directly into the ground, then they will be ready at different times. Early potatoes need chitting now in a frost-free shed or garage ready to plant in April.

Nature Notes by Andy Johnston

March 2024

Walking up Fence Dyke Lane recently, I noticed a huge flock of fieldfares feeding when suddenly a large female sparrow hawk made an attack and killed one. While it was plucking off the feathers a male sparrow hawk made an approach but was quickly chased off. While this took place a buzzard snaffled the fieldfare and began to feed. Unbeknown to the buzzard yet another buzzard was making a low-level attack, and on arrival bowled it over, claiming the corpse.





Buzzards are very common around the village and can be seen swooping and spiralling, especially at this time of the year as they establish their breeding territories. They can vary in colour enormously from dark brown to almost white. Currently we have at least three which are particularly pale, possibly the progeny of an almost white one that lived in the area about five years ago.

Sightings - Derek and Carol have a hedgehog in their garden and regular visits from a pheasant. Lapwings are returning to breeding sites around the village. Blackbirds have now joined the song thrushes in the dawn and evening choruses.

Those of you who live adjacent to our two village rookeries will be getting an ever earlier morning 'caw' as the rooks have started building!

Farming News

This has been the wettest winter of the 50 that I have been farming. It is mostly dry in the lambing sheds where I have buckets to catch rain which drips through holes in the roof and can be used to water the sheep in their pens. It feels like I'm spinning plates, as Thom Yorke of Radiohead sings, trying to keep everything alive in lambing time. Ewes like to deliver their lambs during bad weather and so they tend to lamb in batches and then claim each other's lambs. It takes the judgement of Solomon to work out which lamb belongs to which ewe, to avoid later rejection. Getting colostrum into each new-born is the next essential and the sheep are put into individual pens with their (hopefully) correct lambs. Wet weather has caused a lot of lameness in the flock, and I have lost several new-born lambs because their mother has laid on them and could not be bothered to get up when she had foot rot in one hoof. It only takes a minute, and the lamb is lost, so I cannot rest.

We managed to pick some potatoes recently, but as the losses are now about 70%-80% I may just plough the rest out for the frost and geese to get rid of them.

Scruton Sky at Night by Graham Dodds

Constellations - Orion continues its dominance, but Leo begins to dominate in the south. Its 'reverse' question mark, aka 'the Sickle', at the base, contains the 1st magnitude star Regulus which, through a good telescope, will be seen as two pairs of stars. At 79 light years from our Sun, Regulus will lie close to a waxing gibbous Moon on the 21 March.

Planets - Jupiter remains the brightest planetary object. On 13 March Jove will be close to a waxing crescent Moon . Mercury will be at its best from 23-27 March, low in the western twilight, shining brightly at magnitude -1.2

The Moon - Our closest celestial neighbour is at a major 'standstill' during 2024-25, something that occurs every 18.6 years. The last quarter \bigcirc is on the 3 March, with the New Moon appearing on the 10th. The first quarter \bigcirc is on the 17th. Oon the 25th we'll see the full

Don't forget the long-awaited Equinox on 20 March, when the Moon is waxing and our clocks (spring) forward! Enjoy!
