Nature Notes

The Met' Office forecast for this summer, was that it was would be amongst the hottest ever! During the 2nd week of July, many of you were finding your central heating kicking in due to a cool northerly airstream and cloudy weather. A week later we had the hottest day of the year (31°C). These fluctuating extremes have become a feature of our changing climate, so it is hardly surprising that nature has been affected.

Butterflies and insects have been amongst the losers, and it was not until the middle of September that they started to appear, but in small numbers. Butterfly Conservation have released the details of their count which indicates what a poor year it has been for the butterflies. However, we will not have a clear picture until the outcome of the UK Butterfly Monitoring Scheme, which will give a more detailed and accurate, scientifically based set of results.



Curlew and lapwing are back on fields near Morton Bridge, traditional feeding grounds for these birds. Those of you with bird feeders may be familiar with the large female sparrowhawk which roams the village. Elizabeth Davies wondered whether this sparrow hawk was responsible for the demise of a small kitten that regularly visited her garden.



All Hallows Eve



The 31 October is now commonly known as Halloween. It is largely observed as a fun night of trick & treating for children, but it was originally celebrated as *All Hallows Eve* or *All Saints Eve*, a time for remembering and honouring the dead.

The ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, a forerunner of Halloween, marked the end of summer and harvest and the onset of dark, cold winter days.

Farming News

This has been a strange year, 6 dark, wet months followed by 3 dry, droughty months. This has enabled most crops to be harvested, but the weather pendulum appears to be swinging back towards rain. The harvest seems to have been one of very little yield in any of the spring sown crops. Even the over-wintered potatoes gave very little return but even so, this was an improvement on the losses created by the surrounding spring barley. I was however expecting this after the deluge in spring.

After talking to other potato growers and picking my first rows, I am expecting a season of small potatoes and below average yields, but they are planted on gently sloping ground, so I am hopeful of being able to pick them during October.

Autumn is the season for letting the tups in with the ewes and the way of telling which ewes are (hopefully) in lamb, is to put a coloured marker onto the sternum of each tup. This transfers to the rump of each mated ewe. I try to change the rudd colour each week; rudd is an old word for red, although it comes in assorted colours. I apply these from yellow, progressing through the spectrum to red, which indicates the later lambing ewes. Those who are acquainted with Thomas Hardy's Far from the Madding Crowd will remember the 'reddy man' whose job was to move from farm to farm to 'rudd' the tups.



Gardeners' World

We had a little rain in the last month but then sun and wind, so the ground became dry again, and on 2 occasions, there was frost at night. Some sheltered gardens were not affected but at the allotments the leaves of the marrows, courgettes and squashes were taken and some of my more exposed dahlias. I have never lost plants to frost before in September, is this our changing climate?


Now is a good time to move old and overcrowded peonies. Carefully dig them up, split them and discard any old tubers, re-plant them just below the surface of the soil. If planted too deep, they will not flower. If your dahlias survived the frost, keep dead heading them. The round buds are flowers to come but the cone shaped ones are the seedheads so cut back to a leaf bud. Nerines are about to come into flower; lovely shades of pink to red and white.



Also flowering now are autumn crocus, aka 'naked boys/ladies' because the flowers emerge from the soil before the foliage appears. This is large and untidy but needs to be left to die down so the nutrients can go back into the corm before cutting back. Now is the time to plant daffodils, hyacinths and crocus for next spring, but don't plant tulips, leave until November because they are prone to tulip fire or botrytis if planted too early.
