Gardeners' World

A month of little rain, high temperatures and strong winds, a combination leading to many plants dying without flowering properly, especially if you have heavy clay soil. The phlox in my garden came into flower and quickly died back, so no alternative but to cut them down ready for winter, most disappointing. I visited Harlow Car RHS Garden at Harrogate last week; their borders are wonderful, but they are watering constantly.

Annuals grown in containers for the summer do need feeding and watering regularly. If you deadhead them, almost a daily job, they will keep flowering for several weeks yet. Petunias especially have done well this year and there are some very good begonias in containers around the village which have withstood our strange summer weather.



Most varieties of lavender have finished flowering and need to be cut back to prevent them from becoming too straggly. Don't cut back into the old wood, leave some green shoots as they don't always regrow if cut too hard. Help any tomatoes to ripen by taking off the bottom leaves. Keep working upwards until there are hardly any leaves left; this also prevent new shoots forming as it is too late now for new fruit.



Farming News

As you read this, you will have noticed how the nights are drawing in. The light nights are slipping away quicker in the autumn than they arrived in the spring, which, I think, is due to the tilt in the polar axis. We are reaching 'solar maximum' so can expect more displays of aurora like the ones we have had in recent months.

On this farm I am still waiting to complete the barley harvest because it was late sown and flooded afterwards. Much of the low-lying crop will cost more in fuel than it will yield in grain and the only reason for harvesting it is to tidy the field up for next year.

I am expecting poor yields of potatoes this year, because the wet spring encouraged them to keep their roots shallow, and the droughty conditions of the last 3 months have left the plants short of water. Do I want a lot of rain now? Certainly not, because any wet weather at this stage will cause the tubers to split as they soak up moisture, which means that most potatoes will have unsightly growth cracks.



Scruton Sky-at-Night

The night sky is getting darker! Darkness is broken down into Civil, Nautical and Astronomical 'periods', which vary over the year; go to: www.clearoutside.com to see these variations. The Autumn Equinox occurs on 22 Sept, when we'll have equal periods of day and night.

Comets/Meteors – August's Perseid display was disappointing, mainly due to 'cloud'. Comet Tsuchinsan - ATLAS will become visible from 26 Sept. low in the east at around 6 am; it will peak in Oct.

Constellations - Andromeda and the "Square of Pegasus' enter from the E and then SE. On a clear night, follow the bottom RH point of the W of Cassiopeia, lying NE, you may glimpse the faint 'fuzz' of the Andromeda galaxy M31!

Planets - Gas giants, Jupiter (NE) and Saturn (S) will appear as autumn comes. Compared to these, Mercury or Uranus are of a lower 'magnitude' and best viewed with a small telescope or binoculars. Magnitude is a measure of brightness and is a subject worth covering in future 'Night Sky' articles.

Nature Notes

Virtually every spring a queen wasp builds a golf ball sized nest on the inside roof of my garden shed. Despite the door being open during the day, they insist on going into the shed through a small vent in the apex. This is because wasps, like many colonial insects, create a pheromone or scent trail, which can last a long time and probably accounts for the remnants of nine nests in the shed! A queen began building this spring, but disappeared after a week, probably killed off by the inclement weather. This week I spotted a worker wasp in the garden, and it is the first year we have not had a wasp nest in our property.

Butterflies have also been decimated by the cold spring and poor July weather. Apparently, the Jet Stream has stuck in a pattern further south than normal and brought us a succession of depressions, resulting in cooler temperatures than normal and higher than average rainfall in many places, but fortunately not here in 'Sunny Scruton'. If you have ever wondered why gulls are often seen perched squawking on High Street roofs, it is because they are resident and breed on the flat roofs of warehouses along the Darlington Road. In Sam Turner's car park, I recently saw a pair of young ones make their maiden flight after much calling from their parents.



Recent sightings include a merlin near the sewage works and a spotted wood butterfly in the Old Rectory garden.
